
Welcome!

This arrangement of Invincible is by Warrant Officer II Russ Young, Royal Marines. Original music by these two talented composers has featured in hundreds of movies including some of the biggest blockbusters of recent times; *Harry Potter, Star Trek*, and *The Dark Knight* are just a few. They have been in the top ten in the iTunes classical selection for over 5 years with their first release "Invincible" from the album *Two Steps From Hell*.

Simply Beethoven

This selection of popular Beethoven excerpts has been wonderfully put together for the PSW by their Director Phil Evans. This is a world premiere of this arrangement.

Jurassic Park

John Williams, arr. Phil Evans

In his highly successful book, *Jurassic Park*, Michael Crichton has, with flights of fancy and great writing skill, enabled us to imagine what the return of the great vertebrates of 150 million years ago might be like. Speilberg, in his 1993 film adaptation of the book, provided us a glimpse of the power and beauty of these fascinating creatures. Williams tells the film's story musically, and while we can luxuriate in the magnificent sound production by our modern orchestras, it's nevertheless tempting to imagine what the trumpeting of these great beasts of the distant past might have been like.

1812 Overture

Tchaikovsky, arr. L. P. Laurendeau

The famous overture debuted in Moscow on August 20, 1882, conducted by Ippolit Al'tani under a tent near the then-unfinished Cathedral of Christ the Saviour, which also memorialized the 1812 defense of Russia. The overture was conducted by Tchaikovsky himself in 1891 at the dedication of Carnegie Hall - the first time a major European composer visited the United States. The overture is best known for its climactic volley of cannon fire, ringing chimes, and brass fanfare finale. It has also become a common accompaniment to fireworks displays at outdoor concerts throughout the world. The 1812 Overture went on to become one of Tchaikovsky's most popular works.





The Pennsylvania Symphonic Winds is a premiere wind ensemble comprised of local musicians in the Philadelphia area. The membership of the PSW includes both professional and dedicated amateur musicians who share a passion to create exceptional musical performances.

Under the direction of Phil Evans, the PSW plays a diverse repertoire of music, covering a wide range of styles. The PSW prides itself in possessing the advanced levels of musicality and technical proficiency most often found in professional ensembles.

Game of Thrones

Ramin Djawadi, arr. Phil Evans

One of the newest and best loved shows on modern TV is undoubtedly *Game of Thrones*. Composer Ramin Djawadi says that after he had seen the preliminary animated title sequence (still under construction), he was inspired to compose this main theme capturing the overall impression of the show. The theme has been covered many times by several popular groups and is here transcribed for the wind band by the PSW's own director.

Mary Poppins

Richard & Robert Sherman

One of the most popular Disney movies of all time captures the hearts as a practically perfect musical! Disney and Cameron Mackintosh's Broadway musical *Mary Poppins* delighted audiences for over 2,500 performances and received nominations for nine Olivier and seven Tony Awards, including Best Musical. This selection contains some of the best loved songs.

Yankee Doodle

Morton Gould

The words of "Yankee Doodle" were written by an English Army surgeon, Dr. Richard Schuckburgh. The song made fun of the untrained American troops during the French and Indian War in 1755. The soldiers liked the song, instead, and it became well known by the time of the Revolutionary War. It was often sung by the colonists in battle and it was played as the British left after the surrender of Yorktown. The early settlers of New York were Dutch and the name for Johnny was Janke, pronounced Yankee. Doodle meant "a simple, foolish person." The word macaroni was a reference, in those days, to the young men of London who dressed in odd Italian styles. Like much of Morton Gould's music, "Yankee Doodle" is semi-serious in nature and reflects Gould's uncanny skill in thematic development. Using only the historic song for melodic resources, he contrives a brilliant fantasy.

Songs from Across the Water

Philip Sparke

Philip Sparke is one of the world's leading composers of music for the wind and brass band world. The work encapsulates well known folk songs from around the British Isles and spun them around into this wonderful arrangement. The folk songs contained within the piece are: "The Three Ravens," "The Cruiskeen Lawn," "The Lark in the Clear," "The Piper O' Dundee" and "Men of Harlech."

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Program Notes

The Captain General

LTCOL Sir Vivian Dunn

On December 19 1949 HM King George VI, then the Captain General Royal Marines, dined with the officers of the Royal Marines at the Savoy in London. LTCOL Sir Vivian Dunn composed this march especially for the performance on this historic occasion by the Royal Marines Orchestra Portsmouth division. He later transcribed it for military band.

Silverado

Bruce Broughton

Bruce Broughton's *Silverado* score is music from that rarest of film genres: the contemporary Hollywood Western. The pulse of Lawrence Kasdan's entertaining 1985 film is doubled by Broughton's memorable score with motifs that take modern twists on classic swashbuckling themes. The composer writes: "*Silverado* was intended to be the western for anyone who had never seen a western. With the exception of Indians, it encompassed just about every element in the traditional Hollywood genre, from the battle between the ranchers and the farmers to the shootout on the empty town street between the redeemed good guy and the unredeemed bad guy. Far from being 'just another western,' however, *Silverado* was full of moments of great humor, power, warmth and intense friendship and had a story that defied casual watching. If you went out for popcorn during this film, you could find yourself lost when you returned; the story was intricately conceived and richly told."
